#### ARTSSCI 4MN1 / Local Explorations: Urban Placemaking Course Outline Fall 2019

#### **Course Overview**

This one-unit module will explore the concept of urban placemaking, a collaborative process of animating public and private spaces to strengthen the social and cultural fabric of cities. We will look at community-driven placemaking aimed at solving local issues such as food insecurity, economic instability, and social isolation, as well as developer-led placemaking initiatives with (often controversial) goals of revitalizing entire neighbourhoods.

This is an experiential, place-based course. We will discuss urban placemaking initiatives around the world, including the Rebuild Foundation in Chicago, Project Row Houses in Houston, and Prinzessinnengarten in Berlin. We will conduct site visits of several Toronto-based projects, including Daniels Spectrum, a community cultural hub that was built as part of the Regent Park Revitalization Plan. Using these spaces as case studies, students will participate in facilitated discussions about the challenges associated with ensuring that they are vibrant, community-driven, and financially sustainable.

Attendance is required for every session of the module on both Saturday, October 5 and Sunday, October 6 as well as the evening of presentations on Thursday, October 17.

### **Objectives**

- 1. Expose students to community-based perspectives on city-building that promote civic engagement, foster social cohesion, and animate the urban environment.
- 2. Encourage critical thinking about contemporary urban issues and the role of placemaking in developing more livable cities.

### Components

This class will have 2 components both graded on a pass/fail basis. Students must pass all components to pass the course.

1. Research assignment and presentation:

Working in pairs, students will create a proposal for an urban placemaking initiative or tactical urbanism intervention of their own design that addresses an urban issue selected from the list provided. Each pair will then give a 15-minute presentation about their idea to the class (presentations will take place on Thursday, October 17 from 6:30-8:30 p.m.).

2. One-page reflection on the concept of urban placemaking

Students are also expected to actively participate in all sessions by engaging in the facilitated group discussions throughout the module.
